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



St Patrick's Day

This year, St. Patrick's Day falls on Sunday, March 17, 2024. St. Patrick was a real person and patron saint of Ireland. Born in Roman Britain in the late fourth century, he was kidnapped at the age of 16 and taken to Ireland as a slave. Upon escaping, he became a Catholic Priest and returned to Ireland approximately 432 ADE to help convert the Irish to Christianity.



By the time of his death, on March 17, 461, he had established monasteries, churches, and schools. Since then, many legends have grew up about him. For example, St. Patrick drove the snakes out of Ireland and used the shamrock to explain the Trinity. Ireland came to celebrate this day with religious services and feasts.

It was emigrants to the United States, who transformed St. Patrick's Day into a secular holiday of rev-

elry and celebration of all things Irish. Cities with a large population of Irish immigrants would often stage extensive celebrations, which would include parades and parties.

Boston was one such city that held its first St. Patrick's Day parade on March 17, 1737. it was followed by New York City in 1762.



Since 1962, the City of Chicago has colored its river green to celebrate St. Patrick's Day. (Although blue was originally the color associated with St. Patrick, green is now commonly connected to the day).

Irish and non-Irish alike commonly participate in the wearing of the green clothing. Sporting teams have been known to wear an item of green on their clothing or a shamrock, the Irish national plant. Corned beef and cabbage is usually eaten and is now associated with the holiday.

Some bars and restaurants will even dye their beer green to celebrate the holiday. Eventually some of these practices were adopted by the people of Ireland, they usually did it for the benefit of tourists.

Congratulations to all our new Capitular Masons who passed under the Living Arch at the Grand Masters Royal Arch Class in Jefferson City on March 2nd, 2024. You have now experienced the first 7 Degrees of the York Rite. The Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Masons Degree are the first three Degrees of the York Rite followed by the 4 degrees of the Royal Arch - Mark Master, Past Master, Most Excellent Master, and the Royal Arch.

The first 2 degrees of the Council of Cryptic Masons - the Royal Master and Select Master Degrees complete the Circle of Perfection of Ancient Craft Masonry and complete the legend of Hiram. They are the 8th and 9th Degrees of the York Rite, though chronologically they are the 1st and last degrees. The Degrees of the Council are known as the Cryptic Degrees as they take place in a Crypt under the Sanctum Sanctorum of the Temple, they are known as the Degrees of Preservation as they save the secrets and treasures of Freemasonry so they can be rediscovered in the Royal Arch and by you!

The 3rd Degree of the Cryptic Council is the Super Excellent Master Degree - a degree generally only performed in full form once a year at the Grand Masters Cryptic Day. It is a Degree that hilites the destruction of the first temple and the construction of the second and begins on the last day of the siege of Jerusalem by the army of Nebuchadnezzar. It's a Degree that explains much of the important symbolism of Freemasonry and is pageantry at its finest - it's not to be missed.

Freemasonry is a way of life, a system passed from generation to generation through the language of symbols and allegories. The treasures we are charged to preserve are not only the words of masonic rituals, but the meaning. We must preserve the language of symbols that teaches the lessons of freemasonry, without the key of knowledge the ritual and symbols of freemasonry become empty and unintelligible. It is the duty of all Cryptic Masons, especially those that hold leadership positions in any masonic body to work to preserve the treasures of freemasonry. Teach, learn, lead and live are all verbs and words that will transform our masonic rituals. Through the actions of teaching, learning, leading, and living in accordance of the principles of our order, our ritual is transformed from a noun to a verb.

Join us at the Grand Masters Cryptic Day in Jefferson City on March 16th and continue your Journey.

Thank you to MWB Charles F. Wiegert, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge and his Officers for coming together and supporting the event.








Five Brethren Advanced to the Degree of Mark Master & Inducted Into the Oriental Chair in Putnam Chapter Number 123 R.A.M.


David is the sixteenth Missourian to be so honored with this award since its creation in 2014 and his selection adds to that group another of its most distinguished sons.

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A Brief Resume on the History of the Knights Templar

Multitudes of pilgrims in the eleventh and twelfth centuries visited Jerusalem for the purpose of offering their devotions at the Holy Sepulcher of Christ and

other Holy Places in Jerusalem. Many of these religious wanderers were weak, old, and mostly unarmed; and thousands of them were subjected to the hostilities of the hordes of Arabs who even after the capture of Jerusalem by the Christians continued to infest the sea coast of Palestine and the roads to Jerusalem. Nine French Knights, the followers of Baldwyn, united in the year 1118 in a military brotherhood and entered into a solemn pact to aid each other in clearing the roads and defending pilgrims in their passage to the Holy City. Two of these Knights were Hugh de Payens and Godfrey de St. Aldemar. They, along with seven others, took the usual vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience before the king of Jerusalem. They assumed the title Poor Fellow Soldiers of Christ. The Abbot of Jerusalem gave to them, as a place to store their arms and supplies, portions of the old Temple Mount and te street between the palace of the king and the temple whence they derived the name Templars.

Hugh de Payens journeyed to Europe to solicit a new crusade on behalf of Baidwyn, and he presented his companions to Pope Honorius II from whom he craved permission to form a religious military order. The Pontiff referred them to the ecclesiastical Council which was then in session. Having presented his vocation and that of his companions to the Fathers, their request was granted. St. Bernard was directed to prescribe a rule for the new Order. In this rule, the knights of the Or-der were called Pauperes commilitis Christie et Templi Salomonis, or The Poor Fellow Soldiers of Christ and of the Temple of Solomon.

Hugh de Payens returned to Jerusalem carrying with him many recruits from the noblest families of Europe. The Order prescribed for the professed knights white garments as a symbol of a pure life to which Pope Eugenius II later added a red cross to be worn on the left breast as a symbol of martyrdom. The Templars soon became preemi-nently distinguished as warriors of the cross. St. Bernard speaks in the warmest terms of their self denial, their frugality, their modesty, their piety, and their bravery, "Their arms are their only finery, and they use them with courage without dreading either the number or the strength of the barbarians. All their confidence is in the Lord of Hosts, and in fighting for his cause they seek a sure victory or a Christian and hon-orable death."

The banner or Beauseant of the order was half white and half black, indicative of peace to their friends but destruction to their foes. At their reception each Templar swore never to turn his back on his enemies but either to vanquish his foe or die. The word beau in medie-val French meant a lofty state, for which translators have offered such terms as noble, glorious, and even magnificent. As a battle cry, the Beauseant was a charge to "Be noble" or "Be glorious."

The Order very quickly grew from its simple beginnings to a complicated organization. By the twelfth century it was divided into three classes; Knights, Chaplains, and Serving Brethren. In the case of the Knights, whoever presented himself for admission into the Order was required to prove that he was born from a knightly family and was born in lawful wedlock; that he was free from all previous obligations; that he was neither married nor betrothed; and that he had not made any vows of reception into another Order. That further, he was not in debt, and finally, that he was of a sound and healthy constitution of body.

The Chaplains consisted only of laymen. They were required to serve a novitiate of one year. They were required to take the three vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience. Their duties were to per-form all religious offices and to officiate at all the ceremonies of the Order. The Serving Brethren's only qualification was that they should be tree born and not slaves. They fought in the field under the Knights and performed at home, the menial offices of the household. Later this group was divided into two; Brethren at Arms and the Handicraft Brethren. The latter was the most esteemed group and remained in the preceptories to exercised their various trades.

Hugh de Payens had departed Jerusalem as one of a group of just nine knights bound together in an obscure, unofficial order. He re-turned later as Grand Master of an order which was only responsible to the Pope; possessed gold, silver, and propertied wealth; and was composed of three hundred knights sworn to stand and die if the master so ordered. Instant obedience to his superiors was required of every Templar, and since the order was responsible to no one but the Pope, it essentially created its own system of punishments up to and including the death penalty, for disobedience.

The Templar Rites of Initiation and Chapter Meetings were con-ducted in total secrecy. Any Templar revealing any proceeding, even to another Templar of lower rank than himself, was subject to punishment including expulsion from the order. To preserve secrecy, the wit their swords drawn. Although there is no documentation, legend has it that several times spies or perhaps merely the curious met their death the moment they were caught.

The reception of a knight into the order was a very solemn ceremony. Unlike the Knights of Malta whose form of reception was open and public, none but Templars were permitted entrance. Perhaps this difference between a public and secret reception was attributed to the spirit of persecution exhibited by the Church toward the order in the later days.

Ultimately the Templars held over nine thousand manors all over Europe plus mills and markets. During its two-hundred-year history, over twenty thousand initiates brought land or money dowries to the order. They eventually owned ships to transport men and sup-

plies to the East as well as fighting ships to guard the fleet. With their fleet, the Templars earned revenues by transporting material, secular Crusaders, and Pil-grims to the Holy Land. The Templar financial activities varied from serving as a "safe deposit" for traveling nobles, to administering the es-tates of the ailing nobility who wished for their heirs a safe inheritance. The Church at Rome contributed often and encouraged the same actions in its followers. The wealth of the Templars grew as did their reputation as perhaps the first "world bankers." Toward their later days, the glory and simplicity of the order began its slow decline through weaker Grand Masters.

With the fall of Acre in 1292, the Templars abandoned Palestine and the Holy Lands and returned to the comfort and wealth of their Pre-ceptories across Europe. At the beginning of the 14th Century, the throne of France was occupied by Philip the Fair, an ambitious, vindictive, and avaricious prince. This prince had been in controversy with Pope Boniface. The Templars had, as was usual with them, sided with the Pope against the King. The King of France became envious of the extreme wealth of the order, and their power interfered with his de-signs of political control over Europe. He then secretly concerted with Pope Clement V, whom Philip had placed upon the throne of Peter. Their plan called for the destruction of the Templars and the seizure of their wealth and Preceptories.



Their plans having been made, Pope Clement V wrote to DeMolay, the last of the Templar Grand Masters, inviting him to come and consult with him on matters of great importance to the order. DeMolay obeyed and arrived in Paris early in the year 1307, accompanied by sixty knights and a large treasure, DeMolay had made the voyage in the hope of one final crusade to retake the Holy Lands from the Muslim hoards. A date which even today children around the world consider an "unlucky day" had its roots in the occasion of this visit.

The day DeMolay arrived in Paris was Friday, October 13, 1307, and he was im mediately imprisoned as was every Templar in France. By secret order of the King. the Templars were arrested on the pretended charges of idolatry and other crimes against the throne of the King and the authority of the Church. The fires that the King and Pope ignited soon swept across all of Europe. On the 12th of May, 1310, fifty-four knights were publicly burned at the stake. Neither Knight nor Templar Chaplain was spared.

With the exception of a few nations in Europe, the Templars were forced to flee or perish. They found refuge in Spain and in England, and there warned of Philip's plans, they were able to flee into Scotland

where the order went underground. DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Templars, had obeyed the orders of his superior the Pope hoping for the final crusade to free the Holy Lands. He was unaware of the political tides that flowed across Europe as each nation strove for dominance over the other.

It was decided that the Grand Master should be brought before public view to admit his guilt and that of his Templars. The nobility, the prelates of the church, and influential commoners were invited to witness the historic event. On March 14, 1314, a high platform had been erected before Notre Dame from which DeMolay would make his confession. The Grand Master was escorted to the platform with Geoffroi de Charney and two other officers of the order.

With the eyes of the world upon him and the blood of his beloved Templars on the hands of his accusers, DeMolay condemned himself to martyrdom. "I think it only right that at so solemn a moment when my life has so little time to run, I should reveal the deception which has been practiced and speak for the truth. Before heaven and earth and all of you here as my witnesses, I admit that I am guilty of the grossest iniquity. But the iniquity is that I have lied in admitting the disgusting charges laid against the order. I declare, and I must declare, that the order is in-nocent. Its purity and saintliness are beyond question. I have indeed confessed that the order is guilty, but I have done so only to save myself from terrible tortures by saying what my enemies wished me to say. Other knights who have retracted their confessions have been led to the stake, yet the thought of dying is not so awful that I shall confess to foul crimes which have never been committed. Life is offered to me but at the price of infamy. At such price, life is not worth having. I do not grieve that I must die if life can be bought only by piling one lie upon another."

The others with DeMolay quickly joined him in proclaiming the innocence of the order. By their own words, they had brought monu-mental embarrassment to both king and church to which the only answer was the stake. The verdict was announced for that same evening.

The executions were held on a small island in the River Seine, but a crowd still managed to gather by boat to witness the end of the last Templar Grand Master. Legend says that as Jacques DeMolay's flesh was being burned away he called down a curse upon Philip of France and all of his family, and he called upon both king and pope to meet him within the year for judgment at the throne of God. Clement V died the following month of April, followed by Philip's unexplained death in November of the same year. As the two nemeses of the Templars faded into history so did the remaining Templars fade into the shrouds of time; perhaps an invisible force protecting the destiny of man.

This year, Easter will be celebrated by Christian on Sunday, March 31, 2024. Easter is the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Who died and rose again on the third day after his Crucifixion. The earliest records of the observance of a Easter celebration was in the 2nd century.



Fixing a true date on which the Resurrection of Jesus was to be observed and celebrated has triggered numerous arguments in early Christianity. To which an Eastern and Western position on the day can be found. The dispute, also known as the Paschal controversies, was not fixed until the eighth century.


In Asia Minor, Christians observed the day of the Crucifixion on the same day that Jews celebrated the Passover offering, (the 14th day of the first full moon of spring). The Resurrection was then observed two days later, regardless of what day of the week it fell on.

The Western observation of the Resurrection of Christ was celebrated on the first day of the week, Sunday, when Jesus had risen from the dead. So, Easter would be celebrated on the first Sunday after the 14th day of the month of Nisan (Nisan" is also the name for the month of April in Levantine and Mesopotamian Arabic). Increasingly, the churches opted for day of Sunday to celebration the occasion of Easter. In 325 ADE, the Council of Nicaea decreed that Easter should be observed on the first Sunday following the

first full moon after the spring equinox (March 21). Thus, Easter can fall on any Sunday between March 22 and April 25.


The Eastern Orthodox Churches use a different calculation for determining Easter. It is based upon the Julian rather than the Gregorian calendar (a 13-day difference), which results in the Orthodox Easter celebration occurs later. The Orthodox tradition prohibits Easter from being celebrated before or at the time of Passover.

The Christian calendar shows Easter follows Lent, the period of 40 days (not counting Sundays) before Easter. During this period acts of penance and fasting are recommend by various Christian denominations. Easter is then preceded by Holy Week, which includes Maundy Thursday, the commemoration of Jesus' Last Supper with his disciples; Good Friday, the day of his Crucifixion; and Holy Saturday, the transition between Crucifixion and Resurrection.



In the fourth century, Easter vigil would be established in various liturgical expressions. It was characterized by a spirit of joyful anticipation of the Resurrection and the return of Jesus. In the Roman Catholic tradition, the vigil had four parts: the celebration of lights focused on the Paschal candle; the service of lessons called the prophecies; the administration of the sacraments of baptism, and the confirmation of adult converters; and ending with Easter mass.

The importance of baptism at Easter goes back to early Christianity, when baptism was administered only once a year. In the Roman Catholic service, the priest blesses the water to be used in the forthcoming year for baptism. Lutheran and Anglican churches use a variation of this vigil service.



As we head into modern times, Easter has added numerous practices and celebrations. The use of painted and decorated Easter eggs was first recorded in the thirteenth century. The church prohibited the eating of eggs during Holy Week, but chickens continued to lay eggs during that time. A notion of specially identifying this as "Holy Week" eggs brought about the decoration of those eggs. The eggs then became a symbol of Resurrection or re-birth. Just as Jesus rose from the tomb, the egg symbolized new life emerging from the eggshell. In the Orthodox tradition eggs are painted red to symbolize the blood Jesus shed on the cross.

It is unknown when the first Easter egg hunt was held, but it has been given to First Lady Lucy Hayes,

the wife of President Rutherford B. Hayes. Which was held on the White House lawn, in 1878. This would include an Easter egg rolling contest by the children as a competition.



Easter is a time of rebirth, the Resurrection of Christ. Even though there has been debate over when the celebration should be held, it can be agreed upon by all Christian denominations the importance of the holiday. So as Easter quickly approaches, may you and your families so enjoy and celebrate Easter for what it truly represents.

Articulating the goals, purposes, benefits of Freemasonry isn't easy. Encapsulating the history, the meaning, the symbolism, and esoterism doesn't come as part of an elevator speech. Why are you a Freemason, and what you get out of it isn't a soup question.

Let your story resonate with those who want to be part of something larger than themselves, who want to grow spiritually, who want to be better and do better, who need to be - and should be a Freemason.

Each of us passed through the West Gate for a different reason. For myself, I became a Mason as the result of a pretty bad day. My best friend, Col. Jim Trafton, was killed on Easter Sunday, 2010. Our families vacationed together, we hunted, fished, traveled, and shared adventures and stories.

As a measure of my friends character the funeral procession from Church to the Leavenworth National Cemetery was several miles long. State Troopers blocked all highway ramps and stood to attention and saluted as a sign of respect. Even the trooper that called me that night wanted to talk about his service with Jim, and what it meant to him.

At the funeral service Col. Cliff Silsby delivered his Eulogy and spoke to his military career, his leadership skills, his role as a life coach and mentor to so many, and his many other virtues.

But I was surprised when Cliff said, with emphasis, several times "and he was a Freemason". That spoke to me, and it struck me that was the extra spark that made the difference from a leader to an inspirational leader, from someone that directs and manages to a true life-coach and mentor.

It was additionally significant as until that moment I did not know my friend was a Freemason. That why I knocked on the door and passed through the West Gate.

Each of us has a story as why we joined the craft. For some it will have been due to a family legacy in Masonry, for others simply because Dan Brown writes a good book.

But I would hazard a guess that the majority of us are here because of the example and inspiration from a good man in our past lives. I encourage everyone to share your story; as when you do so we will understand the draw of Masonry, learn how to articulate it, and understand a little bit more who should become a Freemason in the future.

They say that we are all a bunch of stories in the end, so let us make ours a good one. Well, my story has not always been good, but with Freemasonry it has and continues to be great. My name is Larry Wilson, and I am a Deputy Sheriff with the St. Charles County Sheriff's Department. Not only a career, but a lifestyle that I have lived for the last 28 years. Do not get me wrong, it has been an interesting ride and one that I would not change for anything. However, I have seen things that have stained my soul and wish that I could forget.

For years, as most peace officers would, I attended choir practice quite regularly. It was funny at first, but

got old as the years went by. You might ask, "what is choir practice." Well, it isn't where a bunch of police officers get together to sing. Choir practice is when you get together at a bar, drink, and tell stories of what happened during your shift. What you find out fast is that everyone has a story and if you listen long enough, they start to become the same stories. We find out that we all have gone to the same houses, dealt with the same people (that's the clean name for those individuals), and arrested those same people for similar crimes. After a while, it starts to become a bit much because you never seem to get away from the job. After a few years of doing this, I figured that there has to be more to life than this vicious circle that I had gotten myself into. So instead, I started exercising after my shift ended. This lasted me a little while, but at two o'clock in the morning, all by myself in a weight room, I quickly got bored.

So, I added other interests to help pass the time. Building plastic models was fun, but not fulfilling. I tried video games, but I found out that I died more than I accomplished anything. Long walks ended in sore feet, but it didn't help me with my thoughts for the day. I finally decided to research my family tree and see what I could find.

Genealogy was a fabulous challenge for me. Not only did it help me figure out who I was, but it brought out the investigative nature in me that came from my job. A hundred people quickly appeared in my family tree, two hundred, a thousand, and finally five thousand. By this point, I was traveling and getting information from various courthouses throughout the states surrounding Missouri. During one of my trips, I even got kicked out of a courthouse by a circuit clerk. I was being nice, she wasn't, (I will leave it at that). One day, I was sitting at my desk, with a ton of research to go through, when I sighed and thought to myself, "there is got to be more to life than this." Don't get me wrong. I was making great grounds on research, but at the end of the day, I was always by myself. I would travel alone, I would sit in libraries alone in research, and I would be inputting data into a computer alone and by myself. I felt like I wasn't sharing anything with anybody. I would go to work and deal with other people's problems, and then go home to hide in a mountain of research, repeating day after

day. I hit another wall. Once again, there has got to be more than this to living. I was alone most of the time.

One day, I decided to look closer into the lives of my predecessors, and I started to see a pattern. From my Great-Grandfather's time on back, they belonged to a group of persons called, "Freemasons."

That name rang a bell with me. I remember my mother tell me that her Grandfather was a Freemason and past Potentate for a Shrine in California in the early 1900s. She was even a Jobs Daughter at a young age, but that she had a Catholic Grandmother who refused to allow anyone to talk about them. So, in the end, I didn't know much about them. I was always someone who would push the envelope, and I decided to research Freemasonry. With the help of the internet, I was able to discover the good and the bad of the group. What I discovered about that the bad was laughable, and the good, it intrigued me. So, for the next few months, I read everything I could on the subject. I probably learned more about Freemasonry than I should have before I was accepted by a lodge. However, the journey that I was now on has been an 18year trip that has only gotten better and better as time goes on.

My story isn't over yet, but it continues on. It is one of discovery and a journey that I hope will not end for many years to come. I can only hope that this sliver of my life may interest others on their journey into this mystery that we call life.


